He died long ago but his guideline has revisited me in the form of an incredible app, ProWritingAid.

Good writing is about more than just grammar.

ProWritingAid is the best free writing app out there. It includes a fantastic grammar checker but also goes way beyond grammar checking to help you improve the style and clarity of

your writing.

The editing tool analyzes your text and highlights a variety of key writing issues, such as overused words, sentence structure, punctuation issues, repeated phrases, consistency, dialogue, pacing and readability. It helps you learn as you edit, making you a stronger writer.

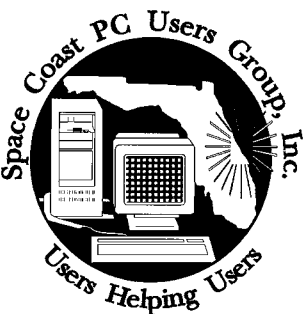
I admit to at least 70% of the infractions above (but I WILL argue over the Oxford Comma until the day I die!). Ironically, one sentence and a paragraph in the block quote above was flagged by the app.

This app is incredible. You can check your work in a multitude of ways, covering every conceivable metric. You can check it with a comprehensive summary. But you can also granularly check your grammar, your diction, look for

We encourage all of our members to submit original computer-related articles for publication in The Space Coast PC Journal.

Writing a Product Review

It is really not that difficult to write a good review for The Space Coast PC Journal. These guidelines will help you get started:

Product information

- List the product name, release level, and manufacturer.

Use

- What does this product do?
- How easy is it to learn and use? Is it for beginners or does it have advanced features?
- List and describe some of the features. If this is an upgrade, what is new to this version?
- What did you like or dislike about it?
- Did you have to call Customer Support? What for? Were they helpful?

Installation

- How much disk space did the product take?
- How long did it take to install?
- Was it difficult to install?
- Specify requirements such as: DOS level, Windows level, Windows type, etc.

Recommendations

- Would you recommend this product?

Remember these are guidelines. They are not meant to be all-inclusive, nor should they limit your creativity. But all of them should be included as part of your article. Then the review will practically write itself!

Preparing Your Articles

To assist us in incorporating articles into the Journal, it would be helpful if certain minimum standards were followed. Use this quick-step guide:

Format: The preferred format is ASCII text files. We can also work with other formats, but check with the editor before using them.

Text: Single-space the text—even between paragraphs. Don't indent paragraphs. Use hard returns only at the ends of paragraphs. Use only one space after periods, colons, and question marks. Follow standard capitalization rules.

Use left justification only. Do not right justify or block your text. (Word processors add extra spaces between words to justify the text and each of those extra spaces must then be removed.)

Graphics: The preferred format for graphics accompanying your text is TIFF—in separate files from the text. Embedded graphics are not useable. Most image editing programs have a "resize" option to alter the size of graphics. Please try to keep your graphic file sizes to around 1 meg in size. Call the editor if you have questions.

Be sure to include your name and phone number so we may contact you if we have any questions. Anonymous articles will not be published.

redundancies, and clichés. There are roughly two dozen checks you can perform. For an extra fee, you can purchase different numbers of plagiarism checks (great for schoolwork).

Mercifully, it includes my dear friend the Thesaurus and even occasionally encourages me to use it (HUZZAH!)

You can also set your own filters or ignore ones that they suggest.

ProWritingAid's Desktop App allows you to open, edit and save your Scrivener projects without losing formatting. It also works with other formats such as Microsoft Word, Open Office, Rich Text, HTML and Markdown.

If you're writing a short story, your blog or the great American novel, there is room for disagreement with their suggestions which is allotted. I'm a musician and composer. In the same manner as a musical composition flows, your words should have a rhythm. This is your 'voice.'

In my opinion, if you're writing a scholarly piece or business presentation, ProWritingAid is a valuable tool. Not to say your great American novel doesn't have its share of incorrect grammar, punctuation, or other literary offenses but I believe ProWritingAid is better suited for business and academia.

It is to writing what the Pomodoro method is to productivity. It enables you to focus because you feel like your boss is standing next to you making sure you get the job done. ProWritingAid took me back to middle school, writing an essay as my teacher hovered over my shoulder.

There is one function that I found absolutely fascinating: Word Explorer. Pick any word and it will present you with an endless list of options.

This app pointed out why my English grades were so pitiful. But it was a great help in improving my writing. I could still use my 'voice' but now had to justify my wording. After writing reviews for all these centuries, it was somewhat humbling.

ProWritingAid is available as part of your Setapp subscription or can be subscribed to in three plans: the Free subscription (which has limitations), the Premium Plan for US \$60 annually (fewer limitations), and the Premium+ Plan for US \$70 annually (there's 50 plagiarism checks included per year).

APIs are also available for developers. That also comes at a premium, however.

And there's a trial version available. Give it a bash. ☐

POWERQ

This is a handy way to charge most of your devices. It is a wall plug with a USB-A port. You can use the cable that came with your device and just plug PowerQ into the wall. There is plenty of power to charge most devices.

The circuitry includes auto-sense, which protects your device from over-charging. You don't have to worry about it catching fire, because auto-sense will stop the charging function when your device is fully charged.

PowerQ is small, only slightly larger than a one-inch cube. It is a handy traveling companion, easily fitting into a briefcase or purse.

AUTOPOWER PD30

This is another handy charger, made for easy use in your car. It fits snugly into the power outlet that's available in all cars (it was used as a cigarette lighter in the old days). It contains a

This month I'll highlight the presentation that I'll be presenting at the APCUG virtual Technology Conference to be held on August 17. I'm speaking on the topic "Most Common Issues that Need Repair from a PC/Mac Repair Shop Perspective". Here's some of the highlights:

Failing or Failed Hard Disc DriveHDD

Symptoms

Poor performance
 Boot failure message
 Hard drive failure prediction message issued by Self-Monitoring, Analysis and Reporting Technology (SMART)

Solution

Replace HDD with HDD
 Replace HDD with Solid State Disc (SSD)
 If old HDD is still bootable, clone to new drive
 If old HDD is not bootable, but still readable, copy personal files off for later transfer to new drive

Web Scammer Messages

Symptoms

Locked out from PC with message panel displayed with number to call
 Phone call claiming to be Microsoft, Dell, etc. Web page that states you are infected and must call

Solution

System restore to last system checkpoint
 Clean/reset browser start pages and/or search engine
 Install Malwarebytes and perform scan to remove any nasty programs

Poor Performance

Symptoms

Slower boot times than normal
 Mouse/keyboard slow to respond
 Browsers/apps slow to load/respond

Solution

Check for malware/spyware – run Malwarebytes
 Check for obvious 'junk' programs in Programs & Features
 Especially programs that claim to maintain drivers
 Check for missing Windows updates
 Check Event Viewer logs for error messages

Lockout/Loops After Updates

Symptoms

Spinning circle with black screen
 Loop constantly restarting
 Message with automatic repair failure/attempts

Solution

Try using System Restore in Advanced tools
 Sometimes just letting it run 15-30 minutes fixes it
 If these don't work, backup personal files and try reset of the OS
 Sometimes, HDD must be wiped and reloaded if Windows cannot be booted after all recovery actions fail.

Latest Windows 10 Version 1809 Update

Just released KB4505658 for Win10 ver1809 is the second cumulative update for July after the Patch Tuesday's security updates. Win10 ver1903 is yet to get a second update this month. This cumulative update is said to fix a host of problems. There are 27 fixed items and 4 known issues remaining. A few examples of fixed items are: Windows notifications would display "nonsense characters" instead of a single quote mark

(^), new installed & updated apps weren't appearing in search results on some machines, and trouble saving work from Office 2010. There is still no resolution for an issue that caused a small number of machines to start up with a black screen during the first logon after installing updates. If you are affected by this Microsoft says to "press Ctrl+Alt+Delete, then select the Power button in the lower right corner of the screen & select Restart," to get around the problem. (For reference latest Win10 market share figures show ver1809 with a 30% share. Ver1803 has 58% and ver1903 only 6.3%.

PC Sales Status

PC sales for Q2 2019 grew 3.2% to 64 million units. In Q2 2018 PC makers sold 62 million units. Q2 worldwide PC shipment growth was driven by a Windows 10 refresh demand in the business market. Strong Desktop PC growth offset a decline in mobile PC shipments. Lenovo is still the world's biggest PC maker. It sold 16 million units & has a 25% market share. Lenovo was followed by HP (14.7 million units), Dell (11.1 million units), Apple (3.9 million), and Acer (3.8 million). Note that in Q2 4 years ago Apple sold 4.8 million units. Today with only 3.9 million units sold Apple has only 6.09% of the market.

Amazon Building a High-End Echo

Amazon apparently wants to get into the premium sound market. They are said to be working on a new high end Echo to compete with Apple's HomePod, Google Home Max, and Sonos One. People have been asking for an Echo with better sound quality. The device is being built by Amazon's Research and Development arm Lab126 and is said to have at least 4 tweeters. Experts are guessing it might be introduced this Fall. Amazon has introduced previous new products in the Fall of the year.

Amazon Music Growth

Amazon is growing its Amazon Music subscribers faster than either Spotify or Apple. Spotify continues to dominate by subscriber numbers but Amazon could surpass Apple Music if current growth rates hold. Amazon's Music Unlimited subscriber base jumped by 70% in the past year. Amazon is now third with about 32 million subscribers. Spotify grew its subscriber base by 25% last year, to about 100 million subscribers. Apple Music has around 50 million subscribers. Amazon's Music growth may be due in part to

popularity of its Alexa/Echo smart speakers. Amazon Music Unlimited is less expensive than its rivals, \$10 vs. \$15 per month. The price falls to \$8 for those with a Prime membership and to \$4 for those who want to listen only via a single Echo smart speaker. □

Google Fi – Short for Fidelity, maybe a country code for Finland, or a new network?

All are correct, but it is the new service that Google is making available that is the real news. At the last meeting where I had a chance to ask, "how many have a smartphone," there was a resounding show of hands that indicated almost 100 % of the attendees had one. (There were actually a few "flip phone" hold outs.) Although this was a "technically inclined" group of people, it is still amazing since the smartphone was only invented in 2007. In just 11 years the smartphone has had an enormous market penetration. Actually the statistics show that 95% of all Americans own a cell phone and that 77% of all Americans own a smartphone. That's around 250 million people in the US using smartphones.

The smartphone is the device that we come in contact with and are most familiar with, but it is the underlying network that the smartphone uses that allows it to connect to all the people and servers that we want to contact. Yes, we use the smartphone to contact people by voice, video and texts, but we also contact and communicate with servers like Google, Yahoo, Facebook, Amazon, Wikipedia, Alexa, Twitter, CNN, SunTrust, etc. to do our bidding. None of this contact would be possible without the network that connects these servers to our clients (smartphones, tablets, and computers). That's right, our smartphones are the clients in the Client-Server arrangement that makes our phone so useful. (If you had attended one of my internet related classes you would

have known that.) So, without the network, our clients would not be able to contact the servers and the servers would just be left idle. But there is a network; in fact there are 4 major networks in the United States that offer nationwide wireless services: AT&T, Sprint, T-Mobile, and Verizon. (Listed alphabetically, not by size or customer service quality or any other quality.) US Cellular also provides regional wireless services, but not quite nationwide.

And now Google is proposing another network service. No, it's not going out and building cell phone towers; it is putting together the already available cell phone tower networks from some of the other network operators and making them available through a service called Google Fi. Google Fi will provide your phone the best of any of the three networks, Sprint, T-Mobile, or U.S. Cellular, by intelligently switching to the best network at that time and location. (Notice the two missing providers.) And it will use Wi-Fi to make calls and send texts whenever it can, thus possibly saving data. And when it connects via Wi-Fi, it automatically employs a Virtual Private Network (VPN) which encrypts all of the communications to keep them safe. They say that calls and texts work on Wi-Fi just as they do when you're using mobile data, and you can continue your phone call as your phone switches between the networks. To do all this magic, Google Fi uses a special Subscriber Identity Module (SIM) card. A SIM card usually identifies the phone (device) to the network. This special SIM card can identify your device to all three networks, T-Mobile, Sprint, and U.S. Cellular. And the really neat feature is that it can switch between the networks on-the-fly, based on many factors. You can order a free SIM card during the sign-up process or you can purchase one at an authorized retailer. SIM cards are now available at Best Buy and online from their website. The SIM card costs \$10, but it comes with a \$10 account that essentially makes it free.

Not all phones can be used on Google Fi, only unlocked phones can be used with the service. Recall that a locked phone can only be used on one specific network. (If you purchased your phone through Google Fi or the Google Store, your device is unlocked.) So, the phone you use must

be unlocked. If you aren't sure if your phone is unlocked, you can contact your current network or the place where you purchased your phone. Also, you need to make sure you don't owe any payments on your device. All Android phones must be using Android 7.0 as a minimum and have LTE bands 2 and 4 (again, the place you bought your phone could probably help you with this.) The Samsung Galaxy 6, 7, 8, and 9, as well as the Motorola G5, 6, and Z 2 & 3 will probably work. And all iOS models must run iOS 11 or higher. The Apple 5, 6, 7, 8 and X should also be ok. (Phones that have been designed specifically for Fi, like the Pixel 2 or 3, sold by Google, will probably give you the best experience.)

The cost for the Google Fi service is not cheap but its billing is fairly straightforward. You pay \$20 per month for unlimited talk minutes and texts, and a flat rate of \$10 per gigabyte of data used (in .1gigabyte increments) until you get to 6 Gigabytes (\$60) for the month. At that point you enter the "Bill Protection" level and effectively you have an unlimited plan for the rest of that month. That way you can use as much data as you need for the month without paying over \$80 total (\$20 base + \$60 data). Most of us would probably never get to the Bill Protection level, but if you did by accident you would be protected with this maximum expense cap. (There is another change at 15GB but most of us will probably never reach this.) With this type of billing, you don't have to pay for an "unlimited" plan every month, but you have one for any month when it may be required. This may be interesting for frequent travelers because the Bill Protection applies to international data usage as well as data usage at home. You can also set up a Group Plan for up to six people to share a single account. With the Group Plan, each additional person is \$5 less for the base plan charge, or only \$15 per month. Billing is handled by the account owner who is charged for the total bill, though it can be set up for each individual Group member.

So now you can get your network service through Google Fi, which tries to give you the best experience from three networks, instead of your smartphone being married to one specific network as most phones are. □

President's Corner

No Joy in Techville?

Pour a liquid into a glass just up to the midpoint. An optimist would say the glass is half full. A pessimist would say the glass is half empty. An engineer would say the glass is twice as big as it needs to be.

A lot of how we perceive reality is influenced by our internal biases and past experiences. As an engineer, I'm used to looking at things in a more clinical, objective way than others might. My wife thinks I am a pessimist, seeing the worst in everything and having a negative point of view. She feels I should be more positive and optimistic. If only I had a better attitude, things would be better. I prefer to think of myself as a pragmatist, dealing with and reacting to things in a more practical manner. I prefer the objective, based on facts, rather than the subjective, dealing with feelings and opinions, to make my decisions.

My wife and I also differ on how we perceive stuff, those material things we own. I have a lot of interests, including technology, and so I have accumulated a lot of stuff. My wife is more of a minimalist and thinks I have too much stuff. Who is right? Again, I think it is a matter of perception. What may be clutter to one person may just be the result of too little storage space to another person.

My attitudes about things are probably shaped a lot by my Midwest farm heritage. My Czech farmer ancestors came to this country in the late 1800's and made the best livings they could farming and raising livestock in Nebraska. There is a lot to admire in the farmer. While farming is a lot of hard work and you often don't have a lot of

control over your situation (the weather, resources, crop markets, pests), you usually must become very resourceful, creative and self-sufficient in order to succeed. Farmers must often also be mechanics, carpenters, plumbers, electricians, weathermen and veterinarians. My grandfather had a blacksmith shop on his farm so that he could fabricate items he needed, as there was no Home Depot on every (or any) corner. Farmers must also be conservationists, ecologists and stewards of the lands, animals and environment. I still have relatives that actively farm, and though things have obviously changed for farmers since my grandfather's time, I think a lot the values remain.

The time I spent on the farm in my youth probably helped instill those values and attitudes in me. I've tried to learn all I can about mechanics, engineering, electronics, computers and technology. I've built my own computers and maintain, debug and repair my devices myself as much as possible. I've become the family IT help person, network administrator, repairman and system integrator. As a result, I've accumulated a lot of devices, accessories, cables, adapters, software, tools and utilities over the years, probably way more than most other people. Of course, the collection does not remain static either, for as technology advances and new devices, interfaces and services become popular, my collection of stuff must expand to support them.

Unfortunately, it is often difficult to determine when something that used to be essential (or at least useful) has become obsolete and of no use and should be disposed of. I bought extra PATA (parallel ATA) hard drives at one time when the computer industry was transitioning to SATA (serial ATA) drives, in order to be able to support some of my older computers. I've gotten rid of some of the drives but am still running a couple old machines that could use them, so I continue to keep a few around. I have a number of devices for slide scanning and digitizing video that I need to be using, but I never seem to find the time. To my wife, all these things I'm not currently using are obsolete and junk and should be thrown away. To

me they still hold promise; I have the hope that I will eventually get to use them productively again. Now who sounds like the optimist, and who's the pessimist?

I agree that clutter can be a problem but reducing it and organizing things requires time. Early in my career, I found it difficult to keep up with the number of engineering magazines and component reviews I was receiving at work. I'd scan the items for usefulness, but making a binary judgment (1 or 0, keep or toss) right at that moment was difficult. A few things obviously went right in the trash, a few were keepers, but the majority were in that gray area - might be useful, but maybe not right now. I'd sometimes toss things and later wish I could get them back. Rather than waste my time deciding at the moment I received them, I found it easier to put the 'gray area' items in a pile in my office. If I found a need, I could consult the pile for the items that were pertinent. After a year, I'd split the pile in two, and throw away the older half, assuming the information in it was now likely out of date. This worked very well for me. My wife was not happy when I tried to use this method at home, however.

Technology has helped some with physical decluttering, as most information now comes in or can be converted to an electronic form that can be saved on small memory devices or deleted easily. There is the problem of organizing all those files, however. I am now a believer in the all-digital / electronic life, in as much as it is possible. I used to have file cabinets full of financial papers and product documentation. Now I get all my important documents in pdf form online and scan any paper forms I receive. I used to save the paper manuals for things I bought and filed them away; now I download them and / or scan them. All my important documents, product info, photographs and videos are contained on a few small hard drives. They are not only easier to store but also safer, as I can easily keep copies of the data in a fire safe, safety deposit box or offsite location. If only storing our physical possessions were so easy.

There is a Japanese woman that has become a decluttering celebrity. Marie Kondo, cleaning consultant, author of the bestselling book *The Life-Changing Magic of Tidying Up: The Japanese Art of Decluttering and Organizing* and star of a related Netflix TV series, has a unique way of determining what to keep and what to discard. I've not read her book or seen her show, but her method, from what I've read about it, involves holding each item, asking yourself if it 'sparks joy', and discarding it if it does not. Those (apparently) few items that do bring you joy are then placed where they are visible and accessible.

I have wondered whether her declutter method could work for me and my tech collection. While putting my hands on every single individual item I own might take some time (I have a medium-sized plastic bin of action camera mounts and accessories alone), the bigger problem I see is the hang up I've always had - determining the worth of the items in my life. What does it mean to 'spark joy'? How does one define joy?

The dictionary (or at least Google) defines joy as "a feeling of great pleasure and happiness." Other equivalent terms might be delight, jubilation, rejoicing, elation, bliss, ecstasy and rapture. Those terms don't seem to describe any tech items I own. This standard also seems very subjective. Everyone's idea of joy could be different, perhaps very different. It reminds me of one of my favorite lines from the original *Star Wars - A New Hope*; it is Han Solo's response to Luke Skywalker, when Luke was trying to persuade him to help rescue Princess Leia. Luke tells Han that Leia is rich, and the reward he would get would be more wealth than he could imagine. Han replied, "I don't know, I can imagine quite a bit."

Nevertheless, I decided to try Marie Kondo's declutter method on a small part of my home office, as I wanted to clear some space to install an Amazon Echo Dot there. The area I was clearing had only quite old things, which sparked negligible

joy, so tossing them seemed easy, but I paused on two items. One was a set of Microsoft Encarta Encyclopedia 98 CDs, for Windows 95. I was going to toss them, but then thought about how things have changed. Once these were valuable and useful sources for information, but now with Google, Wikipedia and the Internet, they are obsolete drink coasters. Into the trash they went.



The other was a Webster’s New World College Dictionary (2005 edition), which had been a gift from my wife. It too had been supplanted by the Internet. Though it did not spark joy, I felt a twinge of sentiment over it, as it had been a well-intentioned gift, and would be useful if some calamity caused the Internet to go away. I kept it.

The more I think about it, the more I feel that perhaps none of my tech items could truly spark joy. Do I feel delight when using my laptop? No. Am I rejoicing when holding my Chromebook? I like my Chromebook and it is very useful, but I am sometimes dismayed when I can’t do something simple on it effortlessly, as I can on my Windows PC. Do I feel elation when holding my digital camera? I like it pretty well, but I somehow accidentally got it into a funny mode, and only recently, after much grief, figured out how to give it a factory reset and return it to normal settings.

Am I in a state of bliss when holding my smart phone? It is a very useful device, and I do seem to use it more and more, but I don’t long for it or anything like that. I do see a lot of people who can’t seem to put their smart phones down, when in a restaurant, while walking, or while driving. Is that bliss I see in their eyes? It looks to me more like a vacant hollow zombie-like stare. No joy.

I don’t think this Marie Kondo declutter approach works that well for technology, or for most items (or perhaps for any items). There is unfortunately a lot more to life than joy and rapture. A lot of things in our lives are necessary not for the joy they bring but for the benefits they provide, the needs they fill and improvements they make in our quality of life. Is that joy? Not really. I don’t feel joy when I hold my toothbrush, but I’m not going to get rid of it, as a little clutter in the bathroom is better than a mouthful of rotten teeth eventually.

And it might be asking a lot to expect Microsoft and Apple and Google and Samsung to be responsible for providing us with joy. That’s what family and friends are for. The tech devices these companies do provide can help us keep in touch with them. We just shouldn’t let the devices get in the way. □ by George Harding, Treasurer, Tucson

myCharge Products

I received two products to review from myCharge.

HubMax

This is a modern charger about the size of a pocket notebook, about 4 ¼” X 7/8” X 3”. It is very compact and weighs about the same as my iPhone 7.

It has two attached connecting cables, one for iPhone

(Lightning) and one for Android (microUSB). They fit snugly into the side of the case.



HubMax

It is very easy to charge the internal battery. It comes with outlet plugs. All you do is flip the prongs out and push into a wall socket. Nothing could be easier!

There is a button on the side, near the top, which can be used to show the battery charge level. There are four LEDs that illustrate the level. The button is also used to start a device charging if it doesn't start automatically.

You don't need to worry about over-charging your device. Nor do you need to worry about over-charging the internal battery of the HubMax. That's handled internally to make sure that no over-charging occurs.

There is also a USB port if you need to use a cable to charge your device.

The internal battery can charge many types of devices, up to and including a tablet. It is rated at 10,050 mAh, which the company describes as 5 or 6 times the usual battery capacity. You can charge up to 3 devices at a time, if you wish.

All myCharge products use the Lithium-Polymer batteries. See https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Lithium_polymer_battery and <https://www.electronicdesign.com/power/what-s-better-battery-your-portables-li-ion-or-li-poly>

The packaging includes the HubMax unit and an instruction manual. The manual is a card that briefly explains the features. You wouldn't need anything else, since the unit is so simple to use.

The Company provides a one-year limited warranty.

RazorMega

This is a larger version of charger designed somewhat differently and with more power.



RazorMega

It has two USB-A ports for charging your devices and a micro-USB port for charging the internal battery.

As with the HubMax, there are four LED lights that show the degree of battery charge and a button to display them. The button can also be used to start charging your devices, if they don't start on their own.

The size is larger, about 6 3/4" X 2 1/2" X 3/4" and is somewhat heavier as well.

This unit includes the same protection against overcharging the internal battery and your devices. When fully charged, the charge process is automatically stopped. The charging capacity is 20,000 mAh.

The packaging includes the unit, a charging cable and a manual card. While brief, the card tells you everything you need to know about its operation.

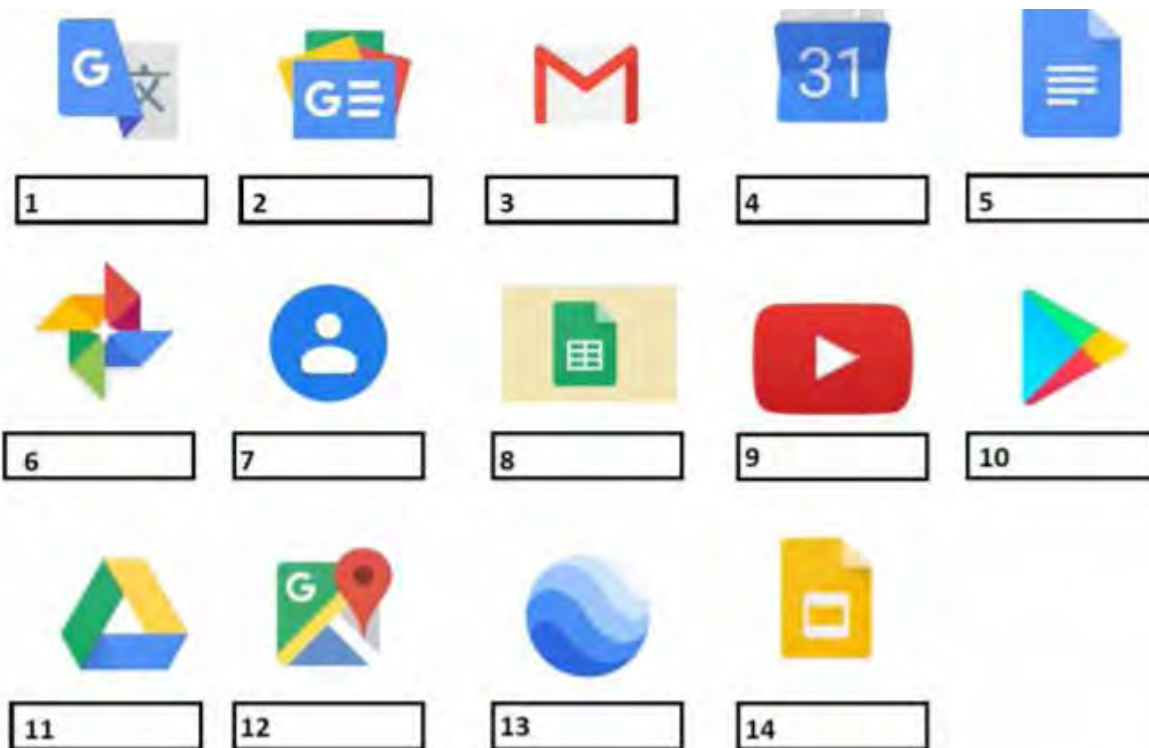

Many ways to track down a PC's energy

Overheating, poor battery life, fan noise, and shortened component life are just some of the problems a PC can face when its energy-control systems run amok.

But Win7, 8.1, and 10 all offer tools to help you see exactly where your device's energy is going — and to pinpoint what, if anything, is using too much power.

Plus: The world's most private search engine?

What's sucking up her laptop's battery power?

Reader C.H. asked for help after she noticed excessive energy use in her portable PC. But too-high energy use isn't just a problem for portable devices: it can detrimentally affect the performance and lifespan of any PC — desktop, laptop, or tablet — running any Windows edition or version.

So, C.H.'s question can be a jumping-off point to look at Windows energy diagnostics in general. She asked:

- “Why is my Win10 laptop's battery suddenly depleting so quickly?”

It shouldn't be too hard to find out. Windows 10, 8.1, and 7 all offer built-in energy self-diagnostics that can help you identify where your PC's or laptop's power is going.

But first, I'll assume that you've taken all the usual steps to maximize battery life. A Google [search](#) will turn up many examples.

You noted that the problem happened “suddenly.” Sometimes, an update or other change can introduce an incompatibility or detrimentally tweak a previously working setting. If you updated/upgraded anything on your PC just before the problem appeared, a good stopgap might be to temporarily roll back/uninstall/undo/etc. that change. It might restore normal battery life while you investigate what's wrong.

Now on to the troubleshooting!

- Win10 Version 1809 or newer: Let Task Manager monitor your software's energy use in real time. Open Task Manager (start typing task manager in the search box and then click the app when it's offered) and then click More details if needed. Widen the new window until you see the two columns on the far right labeled Power usage and Power usage trend.

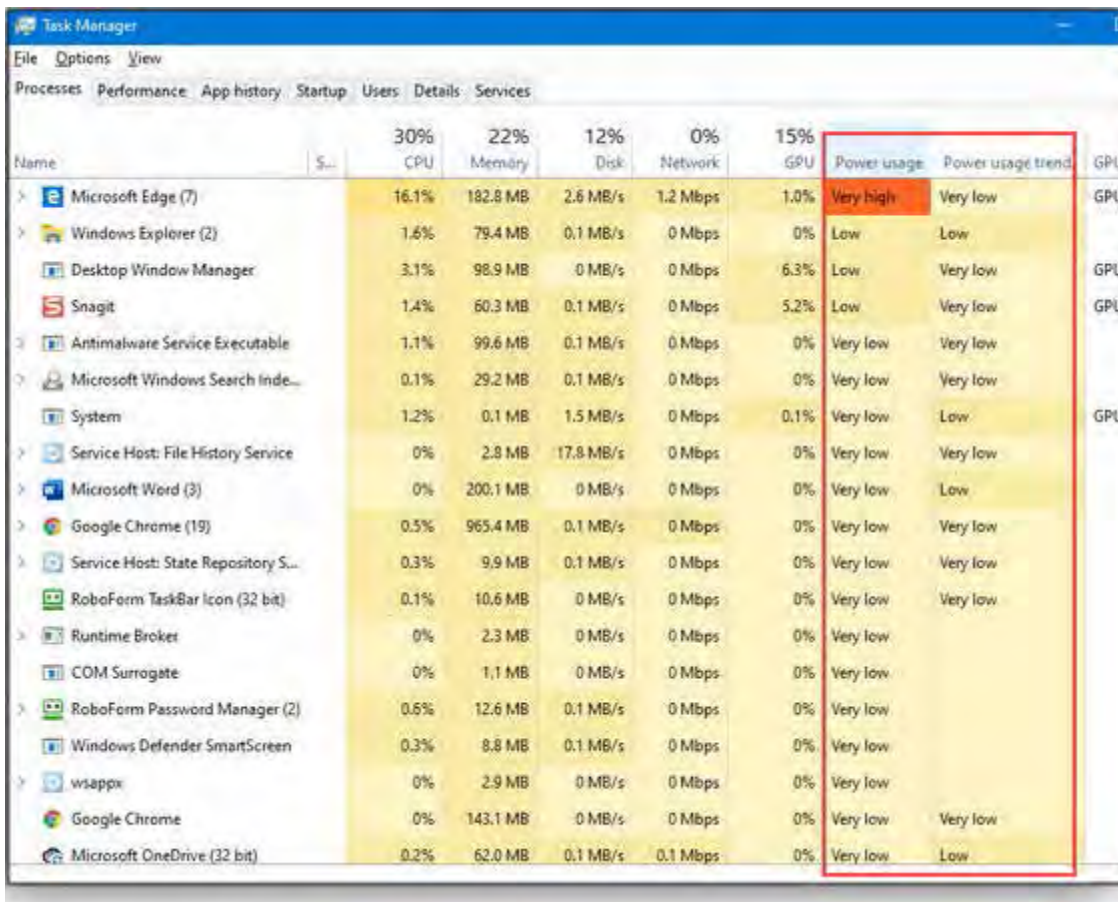


Figure 1. The Win10 Task Manager’s Power usage column shows the energy demands of listed software at that moment; Power usage trend shows a running two-minute average.

The Power usage column shows you how much energy the listed processes are consuming right now, relative to other software on the system. Power usage trend shows the running-average power use over the past two minutes, which smoothes out momentary highs and lows and better reveals longer-term energy-use patterns (see Figure 1).

You can click the header on each column to sort the listed items (ascending or descending — your choice). You also can re-order the Task Manager columns — just grab any column by its header and drag it left or right to where you want it.

Leave the Task Manager window open and at least partially visible on your desktop. As you run through your typical computing routine, keep an eye on the Power usage trend column. Whatever apps show steady or frequent High — and especially Very high — power usage trends are the likely energy overusers.

■ Win10 – all current versions: Run the built-in (and somewhat hidden) battery report command. On a portable Win10 device, open an admin-level command window ([examples/info](#)), and then enter the following text:

```
powercfg /batteryreport
```




Figure 2. Win10's command-based Battery report provides information on your PC's battery and its performance.

When you hit Enter, the command will run and create an HTML-formatted file (typically, C:\Windows\system32\battery-report.html) containing detailed information about your machine’s measured and extrapolated battery life, its original and present capacity, your usage patterns, and more. You can navigate to, and open, the file with any browser. Figure 2 shows an example.\\

The Battery report can point you to potential trouble with the battery and/or the charging system. If, for example, the report shows a wide divergence between the battery's design capacity and its actual, real-life capacity as measured by your PC, you know it's time for a new battery — or a warranty claim!

■ Win7, Win8.1, and Win10: Use the `powercfg` command to generate a whole-system Energy report. Open an admin-level command window (see above for info), and enter the following:

```
powercfg /energy
```

When you hit Enter, your PC will monitor its energy use for 60 seconds and then show a top-level summary in the command window (see Figure 3). It will also create an HTML-formatted file (by default, `C:\Windows\system32\energy-report.html`) detailing any problems with your PC’s energy-management operations. Again, you can navigate to, and read, the file with any browser.

Figure 3. In Win7, Win8.1, and Win10, the `powercfg /energy` command will examine your PC and generate a custom, detailed energy report at the location shown.

Once you identify what’s eating up your PC’s power, you can take steps to control or eliminate it.

For example, if Task Manager shows some app is consuming a disproportionate amount of power, you can try uninstalling/reinstalling that app — or upgrading to a newer version that’s known to be fully compatible with your PC and OS.

Likewise, if the energy-drain problem is caused by a hardware device or device-specific software (e.g., a driver or other control software), visit the vendor’s support pages to download and install the latest or most-compatible drivers (and related software) for your exact OS and device.

Getting back to C.H.’s specific question: If you can’t find the source of the energy drain, I suggest you try a full Win10 Reset or Reinstall (MS Support [info](#)), which should help to flush any/all old settings and drivers, letting Win10 set itself up afresh with the best-available drivers.

If your laptop is relatively new and still well supported, the “best available” drivers should be fully compatible with your hardware and with Windows, and your battery life should return to normal.

But if your laptop is aging, some of its components may have passed out of vendor support, and the “best available” drivers might simply not be fully Win10-compatible. If that’s the case, you’re looking at a hardware upgrade or a new PC.

But with luck, one of the simple software diagnoses will let you identify — and correct! — whatever’s consuming your laptop’s battery. □

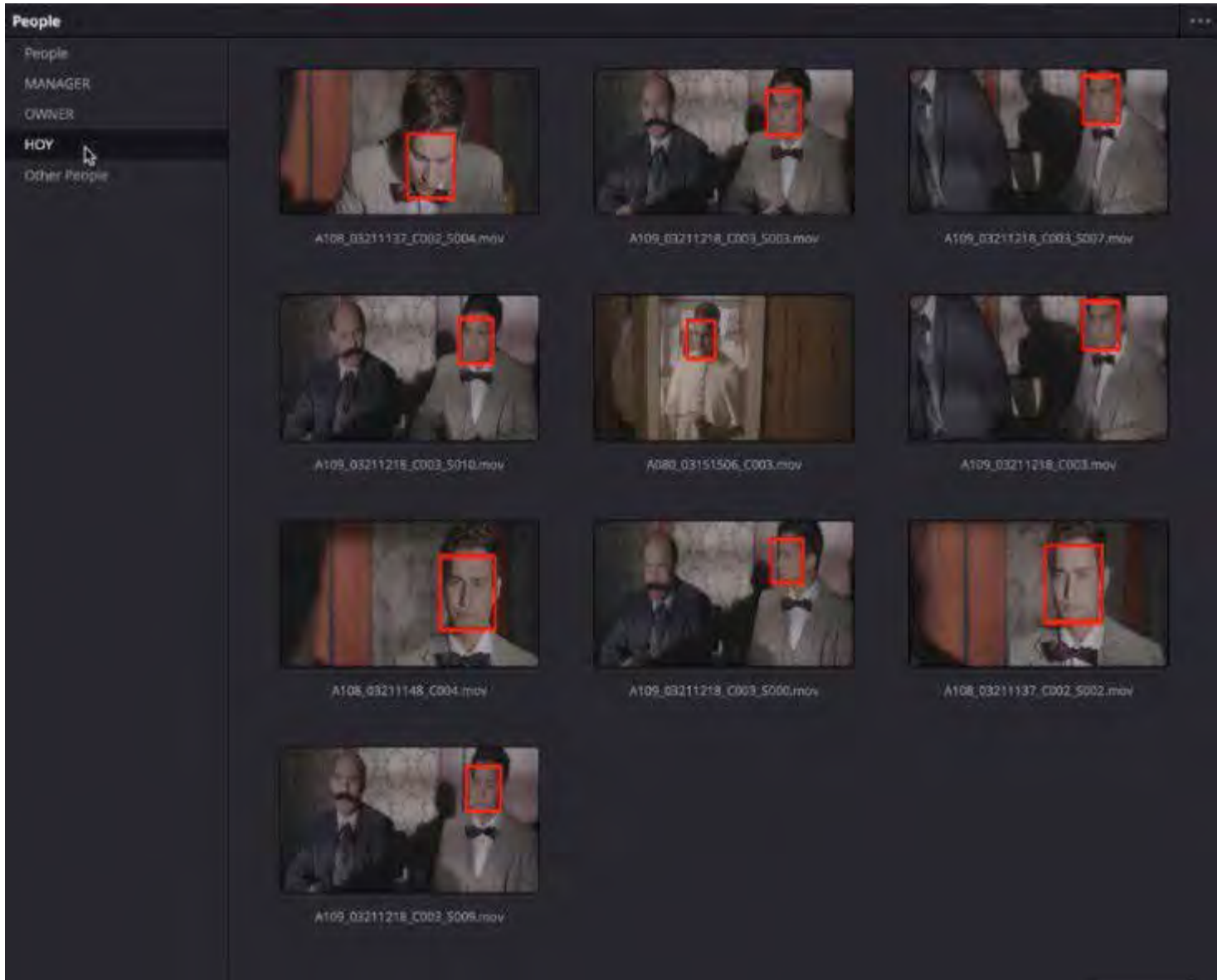

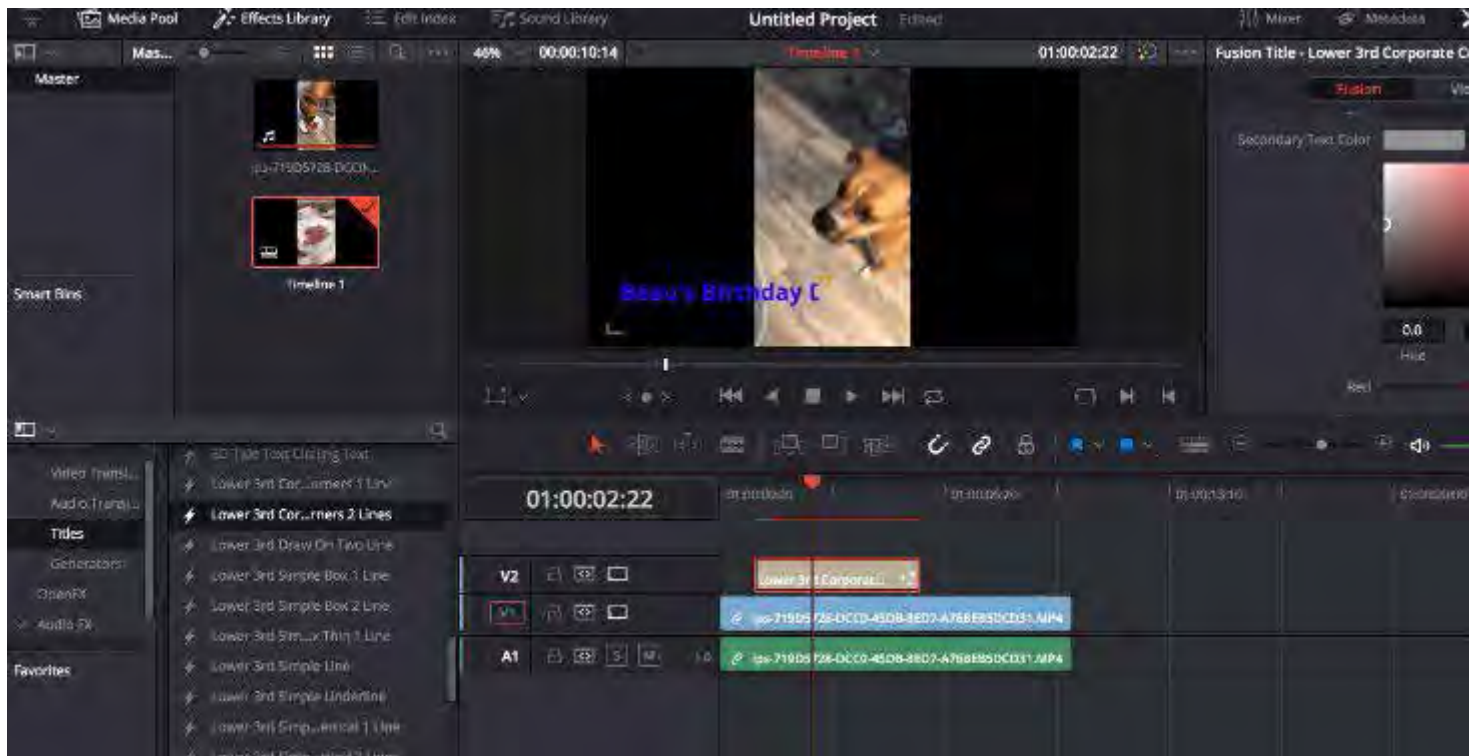

Editing made easy

A big plus to this video editing software is the ability to use text installs and visual editing all on the cut page. The cut page is very easy to navigate and the effects bar is located comfortably to the left of the timeline.

If you have a large clip that needs to be layered with other videos, you can add smooth transition effects to eliminate jump cuts in your finished product. Some other super cool effects provided by DaVinci are contrast pop, lens reflection and the stylizing effect. You can also add text and tradition transitions to any clip.



Color correcting is also supplied, which comes in handy if your camera hasn't been calibrated or adjusted to the correct lighting setting.

Aside from the visual editing aspect of DaVinci, the download also has excellent audio editing features. For one, all video clips that contain audio are portrayed as one single item on your timeline.



Audio can be edited with mixers and meters which makes it easy to see where your levels are and what needs to be adjusted. DaVinci also has tape style audio scrubbing that allows you to correct audio pitch.

Easy to use interface and upload files

The best part of DaVinci Resolve 16 is its simplicity.

Everything from your media pool to the editing features to the timeline is all on one single page. It's very organized and helps you keep things in place with the folders feature it uses.

It also has great post-production tools and renders videos quickly. Once you've completed your editing and production, you can even upload your finished piece to YouTube directly from the editing tool.

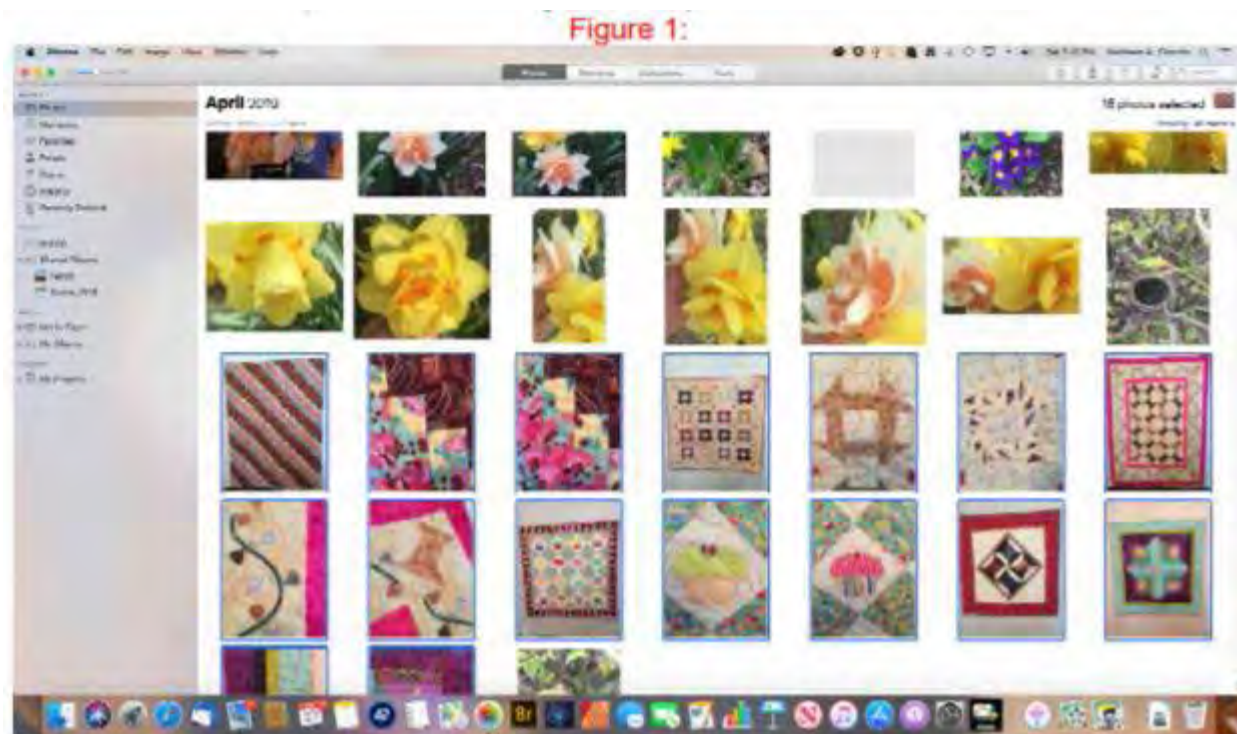

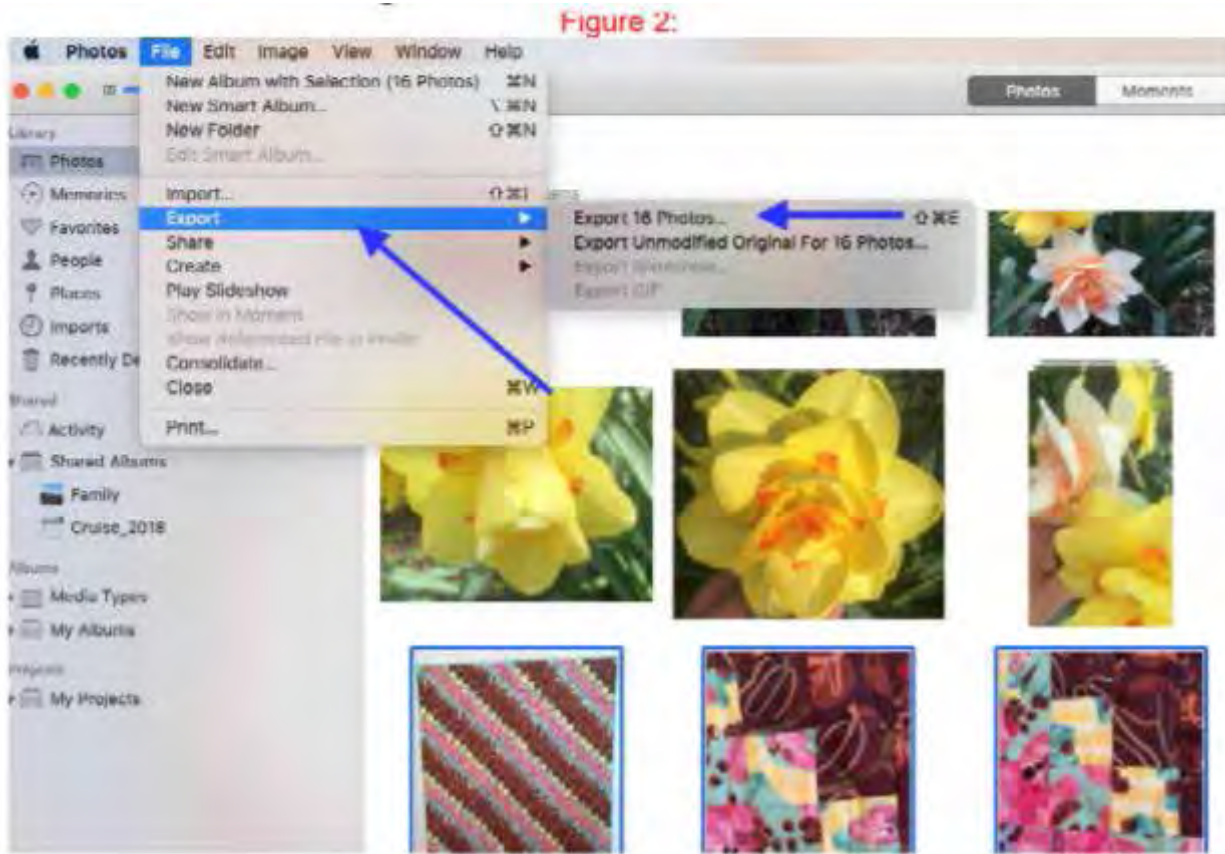

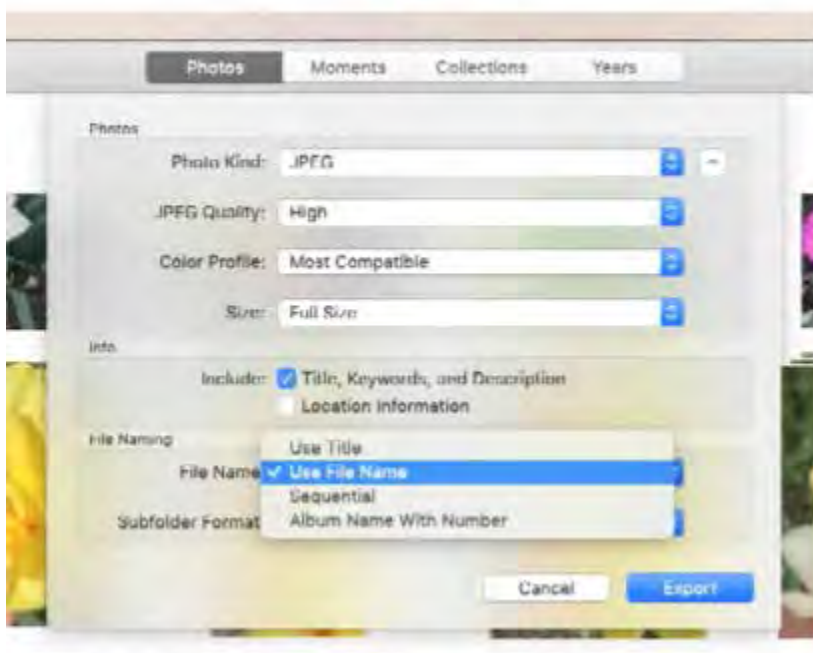

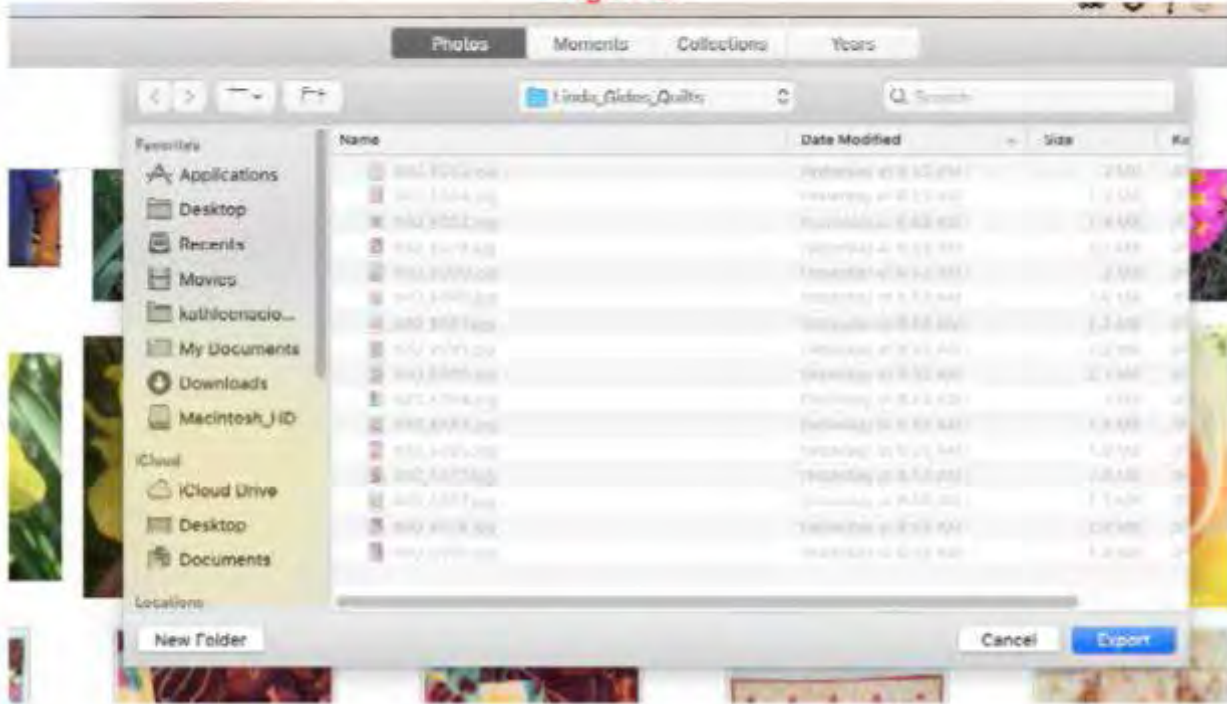

Over 13 years ago, Google bought YouTube for \$1.65 billion. Today that figure seems tiny, but at the time many questioned the wisdom of paying so much for a startup company less than 2 years old. Some analysts and competitors said Google overpaid. Many said the giant company was foolish to take on YouTube’s many legal problems.

Thirteen years later the YouTube purchase is generally considered to be one of the best consumer tech acquisitions ever, maybe even one of the best acquisitions of all time. It is one of a couple of small investments that paid off handsomely for Google, like Google's \$50 million purchase of Android in 2005. The difference between YouTube and Android is that in 2005, only the geekiest of geeks knew what Android even was. At that time, YouTube was already world famous, yet still its price tag was ridiculous by that day's enterprise valuation standards. It was one of the first wild bets a tech giant made subsequent to the dot-com crash of the early '00s.

We love Google!

Many of us use Google's subsidiaries' products such as the Google Chrome search engine, YouTube, Google maps, Google Earth, Nest, and Android smart phones. Some of us, including me, use YouTube virtually every day. Most of us are familiar with YouTube as a video sharing service where users can watch, like, share, comment on, and upload their own videos.

YouTube has also become indispensable for educational purposes; you can learn how to make repairs around the house or "attend" lectures by your favorite astrophysicist.

YouTube rid us of the agony of buffering and YouTube has become for video watching and sharing what Google Chrome was (and still is) for search.

In fact, YouTube is now the world's 2nd biggest search engine. There are more than 1.8 billion people registered on YouTube, watching 5 billion videos every day. Worldwide about 75% of all Internet searches go through Google, including YouTube. For the last 13 years since it was launched back in 2005, YouTube has expanded massively. Google has long been accused of directing Internet traffic to suit its own purposes, and it is said, truthfully, I believe, "whoever owns the Internet, owns the future." Google has never been transparent about how it decides what it displays for search results. Google is a monopoly, considering the 75% of Internet traffic it directs, and over 90% of Google's profit comes from advertising. It is an inherent conflict of interest for an advertising company to be controlling what you see as a result of Internet searches.

Google cares about selling ads, and it especially cares about selling ads against search results and videos.

Google has made some other changes that have served to only confuse people. In August 2015, Google changed its name to Alphabet Corporation, although the stock symbol remained GOOG plus a new class of non-voting shares GOOGL. Why you would drop a nonsensical corporate name that became so widely used it became a verb for an apparently meaningless dictionary word is a mystery to me, despite arguments from management that the change was logical.

Google, as of August 2018, forces you to login to your Google account on Chrome if you login to any other Google service using the browser. Logging out of a Google service will also force log you out of Google Chrome. I don't understand why logging into Gmail, Google Docs, or any other Google service would need to force Google Chrome users to also connect to their Google accounts, presumably giving Google access to its browser history, saved passwords, and other personal information they arguably do not need. In the face of consumer complaints Google has somewhat backed off on this policy, but it is disconcerting that this major change was done quietly, almost under the radar, for most users.

My current pet peeve against Google (besides my missing Favorites) is what they have done with Google Contacts. In the previous version of Gmail, you could switch to the Contacts list by clicking the Gmail menu on the upper left side of the page, but that method no longer works.

Now you get to the contacts page by clicking the Apps icon in the upper right corner of Gmail. When you click the Apps icon, a square made up of nine smaller squares, it unfolds to reveal a panel of icons for other Google programs and services, including Google Photos, Google News and YouTube.

Sometimes Contacts does not appear in the first group of apps and you have to click on "More" to scroll down.

Google has recently come under fire for helping totalitarian governments block information from their citizens, and for avoiding paying billions of dollars in tax by funneling profits to tax havens such as Bermuda, but these serious allegations are beyond the scope of this article.

Google's unofficial motto had long been the simple phrase "don't be evil." But no more, according to the code of conduct that Google distributes to its employees. The phrase was removed sometime in late April 2018. I guess it was easier to change the motto than to change what has become corporate culture. ☐
